Take These Steps for a Healthier Heart

February is "Heart Health Month" and the American Heart Association is quick to remind us that heart disease is the leading cause of death for BOTH women and men. Here are a few tips to reduce your risk and ensure a healthier heart:

Tip #1. If you smoke, Stop! After quitting smoking, your risk of dying from a heart attack is reduced by up to 50%. Smoking, even just a few cigarettes a day has been linked to a variety of health conditions, including cardiovascular problems.

Tip #2. Know your cholesterol numbers. Cholesterol is a soft, wax-like substance found in all parts of the body. While your body needs a little bit of cholesterol to work properly, too much cholesterol can clog arteries, causing heart disease. It is important to know your total cholesterol number. The standard cholesterol goals for adults are:

Best: lower than 200

Borderline High: 200-239


High: 240 and higher

LDL, or "bad" cholesterol level is what doctors watch very closely. The optimal LDL for most people is below 100. Your health care provider may want this number lower if you have a cardiac history. If your cholesterol levels are in an unhealthy range, you may be asked to make positive lifestyle changes like exercising, diet changes or medications to lower cholesterol.

Tip #3. Lower your Body Mass Index (BMI). Being overweight puts extra strain on your entire body, especially your heart. It is important to maintain a BMI no more than 25.

Turn on the light

Sometimes it seems that darkness is everywhere. Turn on the light.

Daylight hours are short this time of the year. The absence of the sun in the early morning and late afternoon reminds us of other forms of darkness in our world. Newscasts are filled with reports of violence and war. Too many people are touched by poverty, racism, abuse, injustice and hatred. Conflict at home, work, and local communities wears us down.

YET, ONE LIGHT CAN PIERCE THE DARKNESS.

Jesus Christ is the light of the world. Christ's light shines even in the darkest hour. Especially then. When we are touched by sadness, anger, or grief, we are reassured that Jesus has experienced these very feelings. No matter how dark it may seem, Christ's light shines through.

ONE LIGHT TRANSFORMS DARKNESS INTO DAWN.

Jesus tells us how to live in the light: Be reconciled with those who have hurt you. Love your enemies. Pray for those who persecute you. Feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the least ones among us. This is how God's love is known. It is how Christ's light is shown.

Each of us has a light within us. In baptism, we are immersed in Christ's light and life. The burning flame of love of the Holy Spirit dwells in our hearts. The light of faith illumines our minds, providing clarity when the darkness of confusion and turmoil threatens to overtake us. When we fear the darkness may win, we look deep within ourselves, rely on the nourishment of the sacraments and prayer, and the support of faithful friends, and we are assured that God's light is there. With this assurance, we reach out and share the light with others.

THE LIGHT IS NOT DIMINISHED WHEN IT IS SHARED. IT IS MULTIPLIED.

The light we have is uniquely ours. It is a reflection of Christ's light, which we are called to bear. Each of us is given particular gifts, qualities, talents, and strengths. If we do not do what we can in the world, something is missing. Darkness will not be dispelled. Christ's light will not be known. Christ's light shines brightly when we offer care and service, advocate for justice, seek peaceful solutions to conflict, generously give of resources, and stand up for what is right, true, and beautiful.

DARKNESS IS EVERYWHERE. TURN ON YOUR LIGHT.

How will you bring Christ's light to the world? Use Isaiah 58:7-10 as a guide for your reflection and commitment to action:

•Share your bread with the hungry: How will you give to those who do not have enough food? In what ways may you grow as a person who hungers for peace, compassion and justice?

•Shelter the oppressed and the homeless: What parish or local forms of outreach could benefit from your participation? How may you become more sensitive to those who are oppressed, unor underemployed, or homeless?

•Clothe the naked: What clothing do you have that can be given to those who are in need? How might you adopt a simpler lifestyle?

Even the simplest task, when done in love, shines with Christ's light. The parent who answers a child's cry in the middle of the night is love for the child, showing God's ever-watchful care. The teenager who helps a classmate with homework, even when he or she would

Who needs your light?

This month, be attentive to those who need care, compassion, and companionship.



Notice the neighbor who goes out of his or her way to be nearby when you return from work. Or the family member who texts right at dinner time. Or the co-worker who lingers at the end of the day. Think of the new resident in your city or neighborhood, the people in the nearby care facility, or the homeless and hungry. Plan now

to visit, call or share a simple meal; reach out beyond your comfort zone; make a difference in someone's life. rather be visiting with friends witnesses to Christ's mercy. The one who serves in the soup kitchen and the one who receives the food with gratitude give evidence of the mystery of the presence of the Holy Spirit who compels, strengthens and inspires us in times of bounty and in times of need.

We know that many times our actions are not filled with light. Whether out of haste, impatience, anger, or sheer disregard for others, we often fail to be vessels of God's presence, even when we could easily do so. Here is the rub: the light never stops shining. God will never stop loving you no matter how busy, stressed, or stubborn you are. God sends his son Jesus, to show us how to live in the light, and Jesus sends the Holy Spirit to give us the inspiration and the tools we need to share the light.

We are called to tip the scale more each day toward loving, serving, and giving. Recognizing our blessings, being mindful of God's grace, and responding with our lives, even (especially) when doing so calls us to sacrifice...that is the pattern of a life through which darkness is cast away and Christ's light is shown.
